Colby Free Press ST. FRANCIS — The Colby High School wrestling team opened their season with a dual win Friday night against WaKeeney and first place finish on Saturday at the St. Francis Invitational tournament.

The Eagles finished at St. Francis with 159 points, 21 ahead of second place Goodland. Scott City was third with 133.5 points.

Danny Mainus and Brent Deibert won their divisions. Mainus beat his first two opponents by fall and won the championship with a 4-3 decision over Goodland's Blayze Bahe at 112pounds.

Deibert won all three of his matches with pins at 215-pounds.

Three Colby wrestlers took second. Scottie Lindberg, 125-pounds; Eric Luedke, 130-pounds; and Drue Herl, 140-pounds.

Lindberg pinned his first opponent, then won a 3-2 overtime decision and lost 2-1 in the championship round.

Luedke lost a 1-0 decision to Goodland's Bryce Bahe, voted outstanding wrestler of the tournament, in the championship after winning two matches by fall.

Herl won a 9-8 decision to get into the championship, but fell 7-3 in the final match.

Travis Powell, Travis Button and Eric Seemann all took third.

Powell won his first match by fall, was pinned in the second and won, again by fall, in the consolation final at 103-pounds.

Button, at 119-pounds, opened with a 7-0 win, but lost 4-3 in round two and finished with a 4-0 decision over Goodland's Mathias Goodley in the consolation final.

Seemann won by pin in the opening round and in the consolation round. His only lost came on a 2-0 decision in round two.

WaKeeney put another six points on their side when Brandon Hickel pinned Theo Kleinsorge with 40 seconds left in the match at 171.


Colby's Zeth Thompson was trailing Randy Hilgers 4-0 when he was pinned 12 seconds into the second round.

Buffaloes knock of Longhorns

Colorado Buffaloes the Rose Bowl elimination squad. One week after erasing Nebraska's road to the national title game, they knocked Texas out of the way, too.

Chris Brown ran for three touchdowns as the No. 9 Buffs turned Texas quarterback Chris Simms' four firsthalf turnovers into 26 points, then held off a rally to beat the No. 3 Longhorns 39-37 Saturday night for their first Big 12 championship.

Colorado (10-2) fulfilled the vision coach Gary Barnett had for the Buffs this summer when no one else expected much from them after a 3-8 season. Their stunning turnaround will continue in a Bowl Championship Series game, likely the Fiesta Bowl. Representatives from the bowl were in the locker room right after the win.

"When we left the hotel today, I told them we are a team of destiny," Barnett said. "No one is playing with more heart right now. Whoever we play next, they're going to face one heck of a football team.'

Simms' meltdown prevented Texas (10-2) from its own storybook season.

Texas knew before kickoff that if it won, it would be in position to move up to No. 2 in the second-to-last BCS standings because Florida lost to Tennessee. Early arriving Longhorns fans cheered wildly when that result was announced and several waved red roses.

Instead, the Longhorns are likely headed to the Holiday Bowl for the second straight year, this time against No. 19 Washington.

"The Rose Bowl was right there," said receiver B.J. Johnson, who scored the first and last touchdowns in Texas' comeback bid. "All we had to do was beat Colorado and we didn't get it done."

> "We always thought we were a great team," said Buffs linebacker Aaron Killion, who caught Simms' first interception and returned it 72 yards. "I believe we wanted it more.'

Colorado avenged a 41-7 loss to the Longhorns in Austin six weeks ago. The Buffs had won four straight since that game, which they gave away with three first-half turnovers and a touchdown they allowed just before halftime that put them behind by 17.

Sound familiar?

In returning the favor, the Longhorns lived up to a lot of bad precedents.
