Colby opens doors to two state associations

More than 50 people from two state community college associations are convening in Colby today and Saturday to talk about relationships with the Kansas Board of Regents, budget recommendations, along with future

The two groups — the Kansas Association of Community College Trustees and the Kansas Association of Community College Presidents — are meeting in Colby for the first time ever, said Debbie Schwanke, public relations officer at the college.

Search for two college freshmen in recovery phase MANHATTAN (AP) — Hopes Shipley, 18, both of Olathe, Kan. dimmed for two college freshmen

missing at 12,000-acre Tuttle Creek Lake after searchers found their capsized sailboat and the body of a class-

All three Kansas State University students were experienced sailors and Eagle Scouts, close friends from the Kansas City area who lived in the same dorm. University officials identified them as Timothy Michael Bennett, 19, of Kansas City, Mo., and Kyle David

Searchers were to resume their work about 8 a.m. Friday in boats and on horseback along the shore. Brian McNulty, operations manager with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, which manages the reservoir, said Friday's work would be a "recovery effort" to find two bodies.

"Based upon the fact that we haven't found them on the shoreline, we presume they are under water," he said. "We've talked to the families and told Chapman, 17, and Christopher Nathan them that in all likelihood they didn't

The three were last seen Tuesday afternoon setting sail from a dock at Tuttle Creek Cove, on the southwest side of the reservoir, in Chapman's 15 1/2-foot yellow racing dinghy.

A search began about 24 hours later and continued until midnight Wednesday, then resumed about 8 a.m. Thursday. The capsized boat was spotted from the air within an hour at the mouth of Carnahan Cove, about 3 miles northeast on the lake's opposite shore.

Bennett's body, in a life jacket, was

found 15 minutes later less than a mile away. The three freshmen were reported missing at 5:15 p.m. Wednesday when their abandoned boat trailer and vehicle were discovered near a boat launch. Three pairs of tennis shoes said to belong to the students also were found on a dock.

At its height Thursday, the search included 50 rescue workers, six boats and two helicopters. The searchers scoured some of the 104 miles of shoreline as well as the lake, which is about 40 feet deep at its center.

Weather: Cool down seen

Temperatures will become more like what is generally expected in December early next week, but until then enjoy the pleasantness Mother Nature is currently providing. Tonight, clear, lows in the lower 20s and northwest winds 10-15 mph. Saturday, mostly sunny, high in the lower 50s and northwest winds 10-20 mph, switching to the southwest. Saturday night, clear, lows in the middle 20s. Sunday, sunny, highs near 60. Monday, partly cloudy, lows in the middle 20s and highs dropping off to the lower 40s. Tuesday, increasing clouds, lows in the upper teens and highs in the low 40s, with rain or snow showers, depending on the temperature. Colby's high Thursday was 63 and the overnight low this morning was 22. Still bone dry for the month of December. The soil temperature at the fourinch depth is averaging 38 degrees.
