# Liquor store shooting reported at Goodland

The Goodland Daily News GOODLAND — Jack Kamper of Kamper Retail Liquor allegedly shot a 20- year-old Sharon Springs man who authorities said was trying to rob the Goodland store on New Year's Eve.

Sharon Springs people have identified the man as Del Ray Dreiling. Goodland Police Chief Ray Smee loaded .22 caliber handgun and attempted to rob an unidentified clerk at gunpoint. When the suspect went around a corner of the store counter, the owner of the store came out of his office with a handgun and shot him once on the right side of his chest. Smee did not know if the robber knew anyone was in the store besides the clerk. Smee said that Dreiling was taken to Goodland Regional Medical Center by ambulance, and was flown from there to comment on the situation.

They transferred money from townships, which had voted to have the county maintain their roads, to the Thomas County road department, which has been working on the roads all during the year.
