Japanese pitcher shuts down Rockies in major league debut

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Kazuhisa Ishii sparked in his major league debut, and Brian Jordan hit a grand slam to lead the Los Angeles Dodgers to a 9-2 victory over the Colorado Rockies on Saturday night.

Ishii (1-0), the second Japanese-born pitcher in Dodgers history, allowed two hits and struck out 10 in 5 2-3 scoreless innings. Following Hideo Nomo's path to Chavez Ravine, Ishii signed a \$12.3 million, four-year contract with Los Angeles after 10 distinguished seasons in the Japanese League.

Jordan hit his fifth career slam off reliever Todd Jones, capping a six-run seventh inning for the Dodgers. It was Jordan's first home run since joining Los Angeles in a Jan. 15 trade that sent Gary Sheffield to Atlanta.

Mark Grudzielanek had an RBI double for the Dodgers, who also got run-scoring singles from Eric Karros, Cesar Izturis and Paul Lo Duca.

A 28-year-old left-hander who pitched in six of the last 10 Japan Series Championships for the Yakult Swallows, Ishii befuddled a Colorado offense that included the last two NL batting champs and led the league in batting average and runs scored last season.

After averaging better than a strikeout per inning in Japan, Ishii's total against the Rockies tied the Dodgers record for the most strikeouts by a pitcher in his first big league game — set by Pedro Astacio on July 3, 1992, against Philadelphia.

But despite a good-sized turnout of Japanese media and an appreciative crowd of 38,693, Ishii's first big league game bore none of the frenzy associated with Nomo's first season in the majors — when the stoic right-hander with the corkscrew delivery was named NL rookie of the year and "Nomomania" became one of baseball's buzz words.

Seven years, 82 victories and two no-hitters later, Nomo warmly greeted Ishii with applause and a handshake when he returned to the dugout after slipping a called third strike past three-time batting champ Larry Walker to end the first inning.

Throwing an assortment of nasty sliders and off-speed pitches, Ishii retired his first nine batters and fanned eight of his first 14 — including 2000 NL batting champ Todd Helton twice.

Ishii, who threw 57 strikes among his 95 pitches, issued a pair of one-out walks in the sixth and watched both runners advance on a fly to center by Helton. But Giovanni Carrara came in and struck out Todd Zeile.

The Rockies scored both their runs in the seventh against Carrara with a sacrifice fly by pinch-hitter Todd Hollandsworth and an RBI single by

Ken Griffey is sidelined

CINCINNATI (AP) — Reds star Ken Griffey Jr. will miss at least 3-to-6 weeks after injuring his troublesome right knee in a rundown during Sunday's game against Montreal.

Griffey partially tore the patella tendon and partially dislocated his right kneecap. Cincinnati placed the All-Star center fielder on the 15-day disabled list after a 10-inning, 6-5 win over the Expos.

The Reds will try to treat Griffey with rest and rehabilitation.

Rookie Jason Jennings (0-1) was charged with three runs and seven hits in six innings. The right-hander was 4-1 in seven starts last season, including victories in his first three big league outings.

Notes: Nomo made his big league debut on May 2, 1995, at San Francisco, and pitched five scoreless innings, but the Dodgers lost 4-3 in 15.

Nomo struck out seven and allowed only one hit, a double by Robby Thompson. ...Ishii and Nomo, among 11 Japanese players currently in the majors, had identical records of 78-46 in the Japanese League. Nomo pitched for the Kintetsu Buffaloes. ... Ishii got some defensive help in the fifth from CF Dave Roberts, who robbed Benny Agbayani of extra bases with a leaping catch before crashing into the fence.

Andy Roddick clinches semi-final spot for U.S.

HOUSTON (AP) — Andy Roddick at last feels like he belongs on the U.S. Davis Cup team. And why shouldn't he?

Backed by a serve that reached 137 mph, Roddick overpower Alberto Martin 6-2, 6-4, 6-2 to clinch the Americans' quarterfinal against Spain, 3-1.

The United States plays defending champ France in the semis.

Roddick improved to 7-0 in his brief Davis Cup career, equaling the best cup start for a U.S. player since Andre Agassi in 1988-89. Roddick gave the United States an insurmountable 3-1 lead in the best-of-five series and was his second of the quarterfinals without

dropping a set. France eliminated the Czech Republic 3-2.
