

As with any age, some elderly persons cope better than others. Factors that contribute to their coping ability include a strong spiritual base, friends and family who are willing to lend a listening ear, hobbies or other interests, and residing in a supportive community. Personality and how the person has coped with life thus far is also an important factor. When these factors are not present, the person's feelings can become buried within and ignored. Complicated grief can develop, leading to serious depression and even suicidal thoughts.

Your friend's concern is understandable, and she may be providing the family support this elderly mother needs. It is also important to encourage the grieving person to avoid isolation, stay involved with friends and community activities, and to seek professional help if those feelings become over-
