#### Italian Sausage Bake

12 ounces de Vinci penne pasta  
1 pound Italian sausage, casings removed  
1 cup chopped onion  
2 tablespoons olive oil  
1 (14.5 oz.) can diced tomatoes w/garlic  
1 (15 oz.) can Italian style tomato sauce  
1 (6 oz.) can tomato paste  
1/2 cup water  
2 cups shredded Mozzarella cheese

Cook pasta according to package directions. In large skillet, over medium-high heat, heat oil. Add sausage and onion and cook for 5 minutes, breaking up sausage as you stir. Drain. Add tomatoes, sauce, paste and water. Cook 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add cooked pasta; combine gently. Pour into 13 x 9 inch baking dish. Sprinkle with shredded cheese. Cover with foil and bake in 350 degree oven for 40 minutes. Serves 6-8. Note: To keep cheese from sticking to foil, spray under side of foil with cooking spray before covering dish.

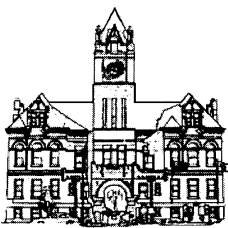
