Two cafes, Bea's and Fleming Hotel Cafe fed the harvesters and townsfolk, Archer's clothing, Craige's Confectionery, (which brought Betty to remember something called "Grizzly Bear Sundae's"); Farmer's Coop Hardware, Glenn's Motor Co., the Square Deal Shop; Parker Service Oil.; Miller's Barber Shop; Farmer's Telephone Co-op, John Showalter, mgr; Allison Howe, plumbing and heating; Foster Lumber Co., Roy Brown, mgr.; Coffey Grain Co.; Eddie Hutton Aerial Spraying Service; Horney Chevrolet; and "for One way and Disc Sharpening see Hack Berry".




