


Here they come...

Colorado snaps four game skid

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Shawn Chacon sometimes causes problems by thinking too much in the dugout.

Against the San Francisco Giants on Sunday, Chacon was so good he didn't get much time to dwell on his remarkable performance.

Chacon pitched seven innings of two-hit ball, allowing only an unearned run, as the Colorado Rockies snapped a four-game losing streak with a 5-3 victory over the Giants.

Chacon (4-6), who earned the first road victory of his career at Pacific Bell Park last season, helped the Rockies avoid a four-game sweep in San Francisco.

This was his first victory since May 8, following several weeks on the disabled list (strained chest muscle) and six winless starts.

He cruised through seven innings, facing just two batters over the minimum. Since Giants starter Kirk Rueter works almost as quickly, Chacon was into the seventh almost before he knew

With all four of his pitches working. Chacon frustrated San Francisco into fly ball after fly ball.

"He was outstanding, very nasty," Colorado manager Clint Hurdle said. "It's a huge building block for him. When you lose the first three games of a series like that, it's a great thing to get a start like that from a guy in the back of your rotation.'

The Rockies' starting pitching has been a big problems of their disappointing season. Staff ace Mike Hampton has been mostly terrible, and Denny Neagle has fallen all the way out of the rotation.

Terry Shumpert homered and drove in two runs for the Rockies, who scored just three runs in the first 28 innings of the series. Colorado had a four-run sixth inning capped by Gary Bennett's two-run single.

Ted Williams' daughter hurt by media coverage

HERNANDO, Fla. (AP) — Ted Williams' youngest daughter expressed anguish over the legal wrangling over her father's remains.

Speaking publicly for the first time since the baseball great's death July 5, Claudia Williams said some media accounts have been "terribly hurtful, and simply not true."

Attorneys for Ted Williams' estate will ask a Florida court to decide the matter when they file the will, as early as Mondav.

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
