Now I've tried to justify what Harvick did comparing it to Dale's pass in the grass way back in the 80's, but in reflecting and comparing the two, it's just not the same.

I know racing always has a lot of gray area and that's where racers look for an edge to the competition, but I believe NASCAR is going to have a yellow stripe or an out of bounds on all tracks period. With all the cars being so aero depended today, you just can't do that apron thing without it causing a problem somewhere.

To prove my point, just watch races and pay attention to how a lot of the wrecks get started during a race.

You'll find that all it takes is for the front air dam to get down close to the apron, and it will upset the car, and the wreck is on. The apron on most tracks is either flat or real close to flat, and the racing surface usually has some banking which creates an angle, and at 150 + mph and the aero package on any race car, when all those factors come together the air is upset that's pushing down on the front of the car to keep it on the track, and with upset air, the wreck is on. Once that happens it's like us when we hit an icy spot on the street or highway, we don't have a clue as to where we're going, or where we'll

stop, or what we're going to hit during of their pocket with no help from city, our Eticket ride. So look for more yellow stripes on race tracks.

Looking ahead to the race at New Hampshire Speedway in Loudon, I'm at the Thomas County Speedway this really going to be watching the track itself.

The Baer Family that owns the track reworked the track from last year and added more racing surface at the bottom of the track. And yes this is the track where Adam Petty, and Kenny Irwin both lost their lives. By widening the track it's suppose to allow for side by side racing, and more room off the corners.

The reason for my comment about the track is the fact that it was pretty flat to begin with and adding to the inside of the track, it's really going to be flat. The track was repayed with asphalt and if it gets really hot, and the torque and weight that the Cup cars have, I'm wondering if the new asphalt will hold up, or will it start coming up, which will directly affect the cars and the outcome of the race. So it should be interesting and fun to watch.

The Baer Family stated in public last year that as soon as NASCAR approves a soft wall design, that they will be the first to install the system period. The family has been involved with any and all soft wall designs and considered trying the system that is at Indy, which came from the Big Red N. (I'm covered a little later.
