Japanese exhibit scheduled at Logan

The Dane G. Hansen Memorial Museum in Logan will be having a special Japanese collection from the Edo Period (1615-1868) from Aug. 4 to Sept. 29. This exhibit will consist of fifty-five polychrome wood block prints and nine Meiji Period (1868-1912) bronze sculptures, said museum staff officials.

Collected and donated by Dr. and Mrs. William T. Price, this exhibit is drawn from the Amarillo Museum of Art and comes to the museum from Smith Kramer Traveling Exhibit Service.

Lee Favre, director of the museum said that by the end of the seventeenth century, Japanese printing business flourished and printmaking began to reach mass audiences with depiction's of life including landscapes, boats, theater, historical events, and images of actors, heroes and villains.

By the end of the mid-eighteenth century, multiblock color prints were being produced in limited editions. The production of a multicolored print involved the artist who created the composition, expert carvers who transferred the images to wooden blocks, and printers.

The final product realized the expert input each provided. A publisher supplied the capital and handled the marketing of the prints.

The works of Kuniyoshi, illustrating hero warriors, can be found in this exhibit as well as works from Toyokuni II, Tominobu, and Hiroshige. Toyokuni's portrait of the sumo wrestler, Tomigoro, could be likened to a Sports Illustrated feature article in that it provided fans with a recognizable image of their favorite star.
