Pershing D. “Freddie” Frederick

Pershing D. “Freddie” Frederick, 83, died Friday, July 19, 2002, at Citizens Medical Center in Colby.

Memorial services were held at Trinity Lutheran Church on July 26, 2002, Pastor David Hall officiating.

Mr. Frederick is survived by his wife, Kay; their son, Rick, of Swift Run, Va.; brother LeMoynes Frederick of Hobbs, N. Mex.; sisters Leatrice Foley of Williamsburg, Va. and JoAnn Janne of Mesa, Ariz.; step-brothers Ed Warren of Rose Hill and Grady Warren of Jenks, Okla.; step-sister Charlene Blackwood of Gore, Okla.; as well as nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his parents, his stepmother Della (Moore Warren) Frederick, and an infant brother, Clarice Arnold Frederick.

The first child of Aaron and Albina Frederick, he was born on January 14, 1919 in Wilson. Since he was born while his father was serving in France in World War I, his parents named him after General John J. “Black Jack” Pershing, commander of the American Expeditionary Force.

He grew up in Wilson, and went to Wilson High School. Then he attended the University of Kansas at Lawrence where he received a degree in pharmacy in 1940.

He began the practice of pharmacy in Norton, but soon entered the Army in February 1941.

He served as a pharmacist and medical laboratory technician in his unit, the 11th Evacuation Hospital, Semi-Mo-

bile, in the campaigns in North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France, and Germany during World War II.

He was honorably discharged in October 1945 and returned to work as a pharmacist in Norton. It was there, on September 8, 1946, that he was united in marriage with Katherina (Katie) Kluender.

The couple moved to Colby on January 1, 1948, where he became a partner-manager of a drug store. Two years later he became the sole owner of the store, which he operated as Frederick Pharmacy until he sold the business in 1977.

Unwilling to retire, he continued to work part-time for the new owner of the store, now called Palace Drug Store. He also did considerable work filling in for pharmacists at drug stores across northwestern Kansas. He was working at Palace Drug Store in February of 1993 when he suffered a stroke which finally ended the work to which he had devoted his life.

He was active in the Trinity Lutheran Church, and served in several community organizations such as Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce. In 1974 he served as the president of the Kansas Pharmaceutical Association. He belonged to the VFW and the American Legion.

Mr. Frederick enjoyed singing with the church choir and was a founding member of the Tumbleweed Barber-shop Chorus.

Music for the service was provided by a barbershop quartet comprised of Don Kready, Bruce Frahm, Bruce Bandy, and Bruce Burfield. Brenda Mattson played the organ.

Memorials may be made to the American Cancer Society or Trinity Lutheran Church, and can be left at any Colby bank or at Kersenbrock Funeral Chapel.

Red Cross visits Rotary Club

On July 23, 2002, Rotary met at the Colby County Club and hosted a guest from the American Red Cross. President Les Brown welcomed Rotary Club members and guest Rotarian Darrin Miller. Treasurer Nancy LePell gave the treasury report.

In Brown’s Rotary history for the week, he informed members the first International Rotary Convention was held in 1910. The first president of the International meeting was Paul Harris. In 1912 Rotary clubs had spread into Canada and the British Islands. In 1925 there were 200 Chartered Clubs with more than 20,000 members. Colby’s Rotary Club was one of the 200 started by that point, it was chartered on March 11, 1924. Rotary Clubs had attracted Presidents, Prime Ministers and other dignitaries.

The Red Cross is wanting Colby to become the zone lead, but Oliver said they are reluctant to do this because they don’t want to grow too fast and not be able to keep up with the strict charting rules and loose the local chapter.

Goodland and Gove have both lost their chapters, so Colby is the Service Delivery Unit for both of these plus all counties in this service area.

Since April, the local chapter has taught 465 people CPR and First Aid here in Thomas County. They still pro-
