Nielsen confirms application sent for water permit

Superintendent Kirk Nielsen confirmed today that the school district has applied for a permit to drill an irrigation well on the Colby High School campus.

He said the application was submitted by hand to the Kansas Department of Agriculture in Topeka on Aug. 9
