Hansen Scholarship program announced

The Dane G. Hansen Foundation will make 188 scholarships available in five categories to students in 26 Northwest Kansas counties for the 2002-2003 academic year. The awards being offered include:

Eight Leader of Tomorrow scholarships with annual stipends of \$5000, renewable for three additional years for a total of \$20,000 per student. Satisfactory progress must be maintained each year.

Thirty Hansen Scholar awards with stipends of \$3000, renewable for one additional year providing satisfactory progress is maintained.

Ten Community College scholarships with stipends of \$2000, renewable for one additional year providing satisfactory progress is maintained.

Sixty Hansen Student non-renewable awards of \$2000.

Eighty non-renewable Vocational Education awards of \$1500.

Students planning to enter the competition for Leader of Tomorrow, Hansen Scholar or Hansen Student awards must register at their school and take the qualifying test at locations to be announced. Information on all scholarships has been sent to qualifying area schools. Tentative test dates will be Oct. 7 - 8, 2002.

To qualify for taking a Hansen schol-

arship test, the student should have been an active participant in school, extra curricular and community activities, have displayed good citizenship, leadership, and moral integrity, and be proficient in both written and verbal skills. To qualify, the student's grade point average must also be 3.50 or above on a 4.00 scale.

Those interested in applying for a Community. College award must be graduates of a high school in the 26 counties of the Northwest Kansas Hansen area, be completing their Community College work with a 3.00 average or better and possess good character and leadership qualities. They will not be required to take the test, but should complete the application and

provide a supporting official transcript.

Applicants for Vo-Tech scholarships must complete the application form available at their school. The Scholarship Committee will be interested in the student's character, activities, goals, and six-semester grades, but will not require applicants to take the qualifying test.

Seniors in all 68 schools in the following 26 counties are eligible to apply: Cheyenne, Cloud, Decatur, Ellis, Ellsworth, Gove, Graham, Jewell, Lincoln, Logan, Mitchell, Norton, Osborne, Ottawa, Phillips, Rawlins, Republic, Rooks, Russell, Saline, Sheridan, Sherman, Smith, Thomas, Trego and Wallace.
