Prairie Gem 4-H Club

There was much enthusiasm as 1,056 eggs were prepared for hiding. Adult volunteers who assisted the youth with the "stuffing event" were Nancy Mills, Kathy Baird, Lesa Carney, and Dorothy Bear.

On Friday, March 29, several of the club junior leaders arrived at the football field in Brewster to hide the eggs. These members included Quentin Bear, Avery Schultz, Michael Eicher, Megan Fulwider, Scott Carney, Timothy Knox, Erin Carney, Andrie Baird, and Katherine Mills.

It was another day for wind but the Easter Rabbits did not have to wear winter coats this year.

An estimated 70 children from the Brewster community came to the egg hunt. There were some visiting grandchildren among the egg searchers this year. Every child left with several eggs and all appeared to have a good time at the hunt.

The community egg hunt has been an annual event in Brewster for at least twenty-two years. In 1980, Judy Reid wanted her oldest child to have fun hunting eggs. She invited the children of women who were attending her aerobics class to find eggs in the backyard of the family home.

Each year the event became larger as she involved local businesses to help sponsor the event by providing the candy and all community children through the fifth grade were invited to participate. Judy used the city park

beside Hunter Hall in Brewster for the hunt.

Seven years ago, Judy discussed the annual egg hunt with Dawn Schultz, a parent volunteer with the Brewster Prairie Gem 4-H Club. Judy was ready to pass the responsibility of the annual event and the youth were looking for an additional community service project. The club began planning the egg hunt for 1996 and has sponsored this fun activity since.

The hunt was moved to the football field at the Brewster school so there would be more space. In the beginning years, the 4-H club also had assistance from the local businesses for donations of eggs and candy.

Over the years, mothers of the young hunters have returned the eggs so that they can be used again. The club has to replace very few eggs each year. The past three years, the club members have worked hard at fund-raisers and the club has had enough money to purchase candy.

This is a neat project for our club as members of all ages are able to participate in the preparations and then the younger members can join others and hunt for eggs. Tradition has the hunt being held on the Friday prior to Easter, it seems there would be no reason this annual fun time should not reach a quarter of a century and beyond.

Lunch was served by the Rebekah's of Brewster, and an old fashioned parade was held at 2 p.m. Clara Wahlborg of Denver, granddaughter of Robert Brewster, was Grand Marshall, and

was presented a plaque, on behalf of the city.

Betty says pictures of Robert Brewster, his son, Tom, who was a cook for the crew, and Clara Wahlborg, along with the plaque, can be viewed at the Heritage Museum.
