

CHICAGO (AP) — Even when he bitches well, Jeff Suppan can't win.

Suppan lost his ninth straight decision Wednesday night as the Chicago White Sox beat Kansas City 3-1. Frank Thomas homered for a second straight game and the Royals managed only four hits.

"He got us deep," said Michael Tucker, who scored the Royals' only run. "It's not like they were scoring in bunches — just one at a time. But right now, it doesn't seem like we can get a break at the plate."

It was Kansas City's 53rd road loss, tying the club record set in 1970 and over eight innings. Besides Thomas' matched in 1992. The Royals need to solo homer in the seventh, his only real go 8-2 in their last 10 games to avoid trouble came in the fourth inning. matching the club's record for total losses in a season (97). The White Sox, meanwhile, climbed back to .500 for the first time since June 20 with their fifth victory in six games. "We're hitting better in the clutch, we're getting some pretty good starting pitching at times," manager Jerry Manuel said. "But the bullpen has always been a key for me."

Suppan (8-16) has lost plenty of games before, but never like this. His 16 losses are the second-worst in the AL. He hasn't won since July 17, a span of 11 starts.

His nine straight losing decisions leaves him one shy of the club record set by Tom Gordon — and Gordon needed parts of two seasons to do that.

"It's been a tough year with all these losses," said Suppan, Kansas City's pitcher of the year last season. "All I can do, bottom line, is keep trying out there.'

He allowed 11 hits and three runs Magglio Ordonez led off with a single and, two outs later, rookies Joe Crede and Joe Borchard singled to load the bases Miguel Olivo, playing in only his second major league game, then drew a four-pitch walk to force in the goahead run. "I probably tried too hard," Suppan said.
