# Anointing ceremony held at Sacred Heart School

Sacred Heart school children in Colby were privileged to participate in the annual Anointing of the Sick Ceremony on Wednesday, Oct. 9. Jeannie Solko, Parish Minister, planned the event. Students were seated among adults who wished to receive the sacrament.

After the welcome given by Jeannie, all joined in singing "You Are Mine." Sister Rosalie Cersovsky was the pianist and Joan Albers, the song leader. Servers were Bob Schroeder and Adam Weber.

Father Galen Long continued with a greeting and Penitential Rite. Jeannie read scripture passages from the Children's Lectionary, the Alleluia was sung, and Father Galen read the gospel from the Children's Lectionary. During the Liturgy of Anointing, everybody participated in a Litany for Healing. Father then extended his hands in prayer for those to be anointed and prayed over the oil. Next he anointed each person desiring to receive the sacrament.

During the anointing, students placed a hand on the person's shoulder, thereby taking an integral role in the conferring of the sacrament. During this time, the group joined in singing

"Lay Your Hands." Joan then sang two meditation songs, "God Gives His People Strength" and "Precious Lord, Take My Hand."

After fifty-five people received the sacrament, all joined hands and prayed "The Lord's Prayer." Father gave a final blessing and the song "Peace Is Flowing Like A River" concluded the ceremony.

Members of the Home and School Association provided refreshments following the service during a time of visiting and fellowship with one another. Fifth Grade students assisted in serving. All students should have a much better realization of the wonderful sacrament of Healing that our Church offers.

Twelve parishioners unable to attend the Healing Ceremony at Sacred Heart School joined residents at Lantern Park and Prairie Senior Living Complex during the Anointing of the Sick during Masses on Oct. 7 and 14, respectively.
