Eric Erickson, who is wanted by the U.S. Marshal Service and was the focus of a manhunt on Wednesday, is now in the custody of the Thomas County Sheriff's Office.

Sheriff Tom Jones said today that the situation started after a routine traffic stop by one of the Thomas County Deputies, Rod Taylor, near the Interstate 70 and Kansas 25 inter-

While Taylor was talking to the 54-year-old Erickson, he was unable to produce proper identification and registration verification for the vehicle. After Taylor asked Erickson to get out of the car, he allegedly hit the accelerator, flipped a U-turn and headed south on K-25.

Jones said Taylor immediately reported the pied.'

chase and pursued Erickson who was driving a 1995 Cadillac at speeds well over 100 miles per hour. Agencies in Logan County were notified of the chase and alerted that they were headed towards the county line.

The chase continued south to the Logan County line, where the road curves between the manhunt and announcements were played time. Thomas and Logan Counties. At that point, Erickson reportedly left the roadway and continued to drive west cross-country.

Jones said that once his vehicle stopped near he had driven through fences and it was evident due to the condition of the car.

"I want to give my highest regards to deputy Rod Taylor, who had great perseverance," said Jones. "He wasn't going to give up."

Erickson lists no permanent residence. The car he was driving had Indiana plates and was listed stolen from California. He is wanted by the U.S. Marshal Service out of Arlington, Va. for a probation violation.

Jones said they have been in contact with that office and will be talking to them later today more extensively.

The stolen Cadillac is being held for processing until it is decided which agency will conduct the investigation.
