To have such equipment, 24 hours a day, takes the dedication of our health care team as well as the technologists who work in our diagnostic departments including Lab, Respiratory Care, and Radiology. Our techs have told us they are proud to work at CMC because of the quality equipment and growing team that makes up CMCI. They have also told us that our equipment stacks up against any available in Hays, Wichita, or Denver.

Imaging quality is so important during the diagnostic phase of treatment. A clear and clean image must be obtained for proper diagnosis. This is why we have purchased the only helical CT unit in Thomas County. The helical CT allows us to continually scan a patient without the necessity to stop imaging. Helical CT is the preferred method of scanning patients, especially for abdomens and chests. Not only do we obtain a quality image, but the time of scans is cut in half. For patients who are experiencing discomfort, this time saver and quality achiever is just an example of what we do for our patients and their care.

The General Electric radiographic room at CMC has the capabilities of performing a multitude of regular X-ray, as well as digital fluoroscopic studies. Fluoroscopy allows us to do studies with the use of dyes and barium. These studies enable us to examine an organ's internal structure. Because of our digital capabilities, X-ray and Fluoroscopy are key players in diagnosis, the beginning of treatment planning and recovery.

Another facet of our advanced technology is our Ultrasound equipment at CMC. Abby Beagley, ARDMS qualified Sonographer, works with this state-of-the-art equipment. Abby will also be performing mammography which will be reinstated at our facility as demand for this service is outpacing what our contracted mammography services can provide. We have just purchased a dedicated mammography processor. This processor is important as no other film passes through the processor except for mammography. This enables films to remain pure, and detection of abnormalities more feasible as compared to a shared processor. Of course, our fixed site for MRI, the study of soft tissues, is available Monday through Friday as research demonstrated patients and physicians needed MRI on a regular basis.

Citizens Medical Center Inc. has provided the training for most of the Radiology Technicians working at various locations throughout Thomas County. We have sent people across the country to be trained in specialties such as Vascular Sonography, Nuclear Medicine, Mammography, CT, and general Sonography to mention just a few.
