Under federal law, it is illegal to have weapons on school property, and students who break this law have to be turned over to police. The offense can be a felony or a misdemeanor and the student must be expelled from school for one calen-

"These are federal laws," Selby said. "If you get state aid, you have to follow them."

School Board talked briefly about the idea of consolidating with the Herndon school system at their meeting earlier this week. Superintendent Kelly Glodt said he had checked with the state De-

partment of Education to see if people who live in the Herndon District could put their land into a district which the school board did not decide to consolidate with. Mr. Glodt said what he found out was that people who live on the border between two districts can choose to put their land with another district even if the Herndon School District didn't decide to consolidate with it.

For example, if the Herndon Board decided to consolidate with the Atwood District, but a family they can choose to put their land showed up.

Glodt said he spoke with Herndon Superintendent Kim Juenemann about whether their board was interested in doing something other than consolidation, possibly a cooperative agreement. That way, he said, the districts could both still keep their schools open but could share activities like sports teams.


