

Lady Eagles get 13th win on road

The Colby Lady Eagles picked up their 13th win of the season with a decisive 82-44 victory over the Ulysses Tiger last Friday night. Colby got off to a fast start and led 30-10 at the end of the first quarter of play.

Things slowed down a bit during the second stanza as the Eagles scored 18 points and the Tigers added 11 to their total. The half time score was Colby 48, Ulysses 21. The Lady Eagles had a balanced attack with nine different players scoring in the contest. Bethanie Linden led all scorers in the game with a career high 27 points. Linden was also credited with a double-double as she hauled down 11 rebounds. She also had 4 steals, 3 assists, and 1 blocked shot. Amanda Seemann contributed 13 points, 4 boards, 3 steals, and 2 assists. Emily Sloan added 12 points, 5 rebounds, 2 steals, 2 assists, and 3 blocked shots. Summar Stephens scored 8 points, grabbed 6 rebounds, recorded 3 steals, and had a team high 6 assists. Breann Hart was 4-4 from the charity stripe and hit a shot from beyond the arc to score 7 points in the contest. Hart was also credited with 1 rebound. Samantha Wolf connected on 2 of 3 shots from 3-point land and finished the game with 6 points, 1 rebound, and 3 assists. Ivy Ramsey was credited with 5 points, 1 rebound, 1 assist and 1 blocked shot. Brianna Swafford contributed 2 points, 3 rebounds, led the team with 8 steals, and had 3 assists. Rounding out the scoring for Colby was Desiree Sharp with 2 points. Others seeing action were Jessica Stephens with 1 rebound, Marcia Kaus with a steal, Shea McKee recorded 1 steal. As a team, the Lady Eagles connected on 43 percent from 2-point land, 37 percent from behind the 3-point line, and 76 percent from the charity stripe. In JV action, the Lady Eagles improved their record to 8-3 with a commanding 60-30 win. The Eagles jumped out to an 18-4 lead after one period of play and increased their lead at the break to 36-13. Jessica Stephens continues to lead the way with 19 points, 1 rebound, 4 steals, and 4 assists. Marcia Kaus recorded a double-double with 15 points, 11 boards, 2 steals and 2 assists. Zanae Baird tossed in 11 points, grabbed 8 rebounds, recorded 3 steals, and 1 blocked shot. Shea McKee scored 6 points, had 1 rebound, led the team with 5 take-aways and dished out 3 assists. Crystal Mannebach finished the game with 5 points, 2 boards, and 1 assist. Shawna Cox contributed 2 points, 7 rebounds, 2 steals, and 3 assists. Tasha Fromholtz finished the game with 2 points. Morgan Stephens added 3 rebounds, 1 steal and 1 assist. Others seeing action were Jacquie Fry with 1 rebound and Nikole Schroeder.

The JV shot 58 percent from the free throw line, 36 percent from the floor and 50 percent (2-4) from beyond the arc. The Lady Eagles C-Team defeated the Lady Tigers by the final score of 41-31. The Eagles trailed 5-14 after one period of play but held Ulysses scoreless in the second period to tie the game at 14 by half-time. Tasha Fromholtz recorded a double-double with 12 points and 12 boards. Morgan Stephens added 10 points, 7 rebounds, 3 steals, and 1 assist. Nikole Schroeder tossed in 7 points, hauled down 3 boards, recorded 4 steals and 2 assists. Crystal Mannebach finished the game with 6 points, 3 rebounds, and 1 steal. Andrea Barker contributed 5 points, 6 boards, 1 steal, and 5 assists. Jacquie Fry scored 1 point, grabbed 2 rebounds, had 1 steal and 2 assists. Next action for the Lady Eagles will be Tuesday as the travel to Garden City.

Take Kansas State's 91-89 setback Saturday to No. 6 Oklahoma, for example. "You can get considerably better because of these kind of games," Wildcat coach Jim Wooldridge said. "Or you can break." Fans sure got their money's worth, even if they did have to sit around for about 15 minutes in the second half while somebody tried to fix the shot clock. There were 14 lead changes in the first half alone. Tim Ellis, with one-tenth of a second left in regulation, canned a 3-pointer for an 82-82 tie that brought the crowd to its feet. "We had opportunities to break," said Wooldridge, who is in his third year of trying to repair the harm done during the regime of his predecessor, Tom Asbury. "But we held serve. We made some big free throws. We made a big shot at the end of regulation. That game could have been lost in both halves. "Yet, we played with enough poise and enough courage and enough toughness to give ourselves an opportunity to win against a topflight team. "I was pleased with that."
