For those wanting a challenge, ily enrollment costs, D'Ette said. D'Ette Scholtz, Thomas County Extension agent, Walk Kansas might just be the answer.

"Can you meet the challenge of walking 423 miles?," she queried. "For most Kansans, walking across the state might seem impossible, but it's not.'

For those of who haven't heard of Walk Kansas, it's an eight week health and fitness program. Walk Kansas encourages teams of up to six people to log miles (or minutes of activity that equal miles) that can make covering the distance easy, she said.

Team members can walk together or individually, inside or outside, anytime or anyway that fits their schedule and lifestyle. It is approximately 30 minutes a day or 1.75 miles for 5 days a week.

"Close to 200 Thomas County residents took on the challenge last year and succeeded," she said, "and now the Thomas County Extension Office is gearing up for its second year of sponsoring the Walk Kansas program.

The fitness program targets Kansans of all ages, and includes opportunities for people who may not consider themselves "athletes." The goal is to help people learn to make physical activity a habit and improve their health in the process, Scholtz said.

Participating in Walk Kansas is easy and inexpensive. Enrollment of \$5 includes health tips, a newsletter, awards and prizes, and of course, an opportunity to have fun while improving health and fitness. Walk Kansas t-shirts are available for an additional \$5



The group will meet at 1275 W. 6th St. and a former Alateen member will serve as the facilitator, she said.


"The group was formed after parents from Colby, Atwood, Oakley and Goodland expressed an interest in Alateen," she said.

The group is open to anyone interested in learning about alcoholism as an illness and how it impacts their lives, both physically and emotionally.


"Alateen is an anonymous program and there are no dues or fees for membership," she said
