Twelve Colby Priscilla Club members met at the home of Jo Kready on Thursday evening. Vice-President Jerri Shuman opened the meeting by having Joan Adrian introduce her brother-in-law, Tim Adrian, of Colby.

Mr. Adrian shared artifacts dated back to the Paleo Indian time period of 6,000 to 10,000 B.C. The artifacts, consisting mainly of stone working tools and some weapons, were found on his property in northwest Norton County around 1981. Located in the pasture and some farm ground, many of the rock tools would surface after a spring rain. Mr. Adrian showed stones that had been honed to use in hide cleaning, "block" end scrapers, cutting tools, spokeshaves, and one very famous Hell Gap spear point which served to date the entire find to about 7,000 to 8,000 B.C.

This site was named the Tim Adrian Site and was researched and excavated extensively by Dr. Patricia O'Brien, now retired from Kansas State University, along with her team of archeologists. At the time of this finding, Dr. O'Brien Kansas State University.

The rocks the Indians used were mainly Miobrara chert, and were excavated by the Indians along Spring Creek to use as tools. A source rock was found that showed where parts of the rock had been knocked off to make tools

Other sites similar to the Tim Adrian Site include the Casper, Wyo. site, one in Northeast Colorado, Montana, Scottsbluff, Nebraska, and Alberta, Canada.
