As a lack of water is a major problem in Northwest Kansas, he suggested using drip irrigation for flower and vegetable gardens. He also said people are going to have to learn to plant low water use plants

March is National Women's History Month

Phoebe Ann Mozee was a dead shot even as a child. She helped support her family by shooting game.

In 1876, as a teenager, she entered a shooting match with a champion marksman, Frank Butler. She won the match — and a husband.

Phoebe changed her name to Annie Oakley and performed in expositions with Frank.

Oakley became world-famous when she and Frank joined Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show in 1885. She toured with the show for more than 15 years.

Her skill with a gun was legendary. She could hit a target shooting backward over her shoulder, shoot a dime from between her husband's thumb and fingers, and shoot the flames off revolving candles while standing on a galloping horse.

Though she stood less than five feet tall and weighed less than 100 pounds, Annie's steady hand and keen eyesight made her a legend of the Wild West.
