

Trojan baseball had tough week

Trojan fans, after a tough week against Seward, Hutchinson, and surprisingly, Dodge City, we headed into a doubleheader this past Monday against a Western Nebraska team that was on a 15 game winning streak.

Dodge City coach Mike Jones. Jones had several successful seasons at Dodge before moving to Western. Two seasons ago we gave him a going away present with an upset in the Sub-Region playoffs down in Hutchinson. Dodge City was the three seed that year and after a 2-1 loss against Barton, we took our revenge out on the Conqs. Although they had beat us four times that season, we got to them for 10 hits and won 10-4.

Back to this season, in game one Monday our bats were shut down almost completely as the Cougars rolled to an 8-0 victory. We had just four hits against their 15.

Game two went much differently, but had the same result. Behind 10-3 in the bottom of the fifth we rallied for six runs.

Freshman Brian Hassing started the comeback with a single to left. Then freshman Dustin Moore walked and freshman Jerad McBride loaded the bases with a single to right. Sophomore right fielder Travis Glassman, nursing a bad hamstring, then singled home the first run of the inning with a shot to right.

I was coaching first base at the time and Glassman said to me, "McClure needs to clear the bases," and that is just what freshman left fielder Dan McClure did with a double to the left-center gap. Freshman shortstop Nick Krick then walked, and freshman center fielder Joel Gould completed the scoring with a double down the left field line that drove in both McClure and Krick.

McClure and Glassman both had great games. McClure went 3 for 5 with a double and five RBIs and Glassman went 3 for 4 with an RBL.

Despite the great comeback, at the end of the game we found ourselves on the wrong side of a 12-9 decision and in the midst of an eight game skid. But with heads held high we went into Wednes-

My optimism proved warranted as we came out hot scoring six in the bottom of the first. The inning starting off with both Dan McClure, and sophomore infielder Ian Mabb, getting hit by pitches. Joel Gould then lined a single to left to score McClure and Brian Hassing nailed a triple to right to plate Mabb and Gould. Sophomore Keith Wollis then singled to left to score Hassing. After freshman catcher Kyle Sandusky was plunked, sophomore Justin Dickson singled to center to bring home Wollis. Four batters later Mabb found himself up again, and hit by a pitch again, to bring home the sixth Trojan run of the inning.

From that point we cruised to an 11-3 victory. Hassing finished the game 3 for 4 with a triple and two RBIs. He was 5 for 7 on the day. Wollis went 2 for 4 in the second game and Dickson was 3 for 3 with a titanic home run to right in the sixth. Travis Glassman from Oakley finished the game 3 for 4 with an RBI. He reached base all four at-bats. Glassman is 7 for his last 11 with three runs scored.

Freshman Tyler Landenberger again pitched impressively allowing just one earned run and striking out seven in five innings of work to record his third victory of the season.

Our game for this Monday has been canceled due to Western Nebraska's need to play conference make-up games. Conference games always take precedent over non-conference games. Wednesday we travel to Pratt and Saturday we take on Garden City at home.

Sherwood led the women's team by winning the breakaway roping after splitting seventh in the first go round with a time of 3.6 seconds. She won the second go round with a time of 3.2 seconds and was first in the average. Sherwood is currently fourth in the regional breakaway standings.

KU makes Self official

AP Sports Writer LAWRENCE (AP) — Bill Self made a good first impression on his new Kansas team.

The next step is for the 40-yearold Oklahoma native to be formally introduced as the successor to Roy Williams, who won more than four of every five games in 15 years with the Jayhawks but moved last week to North Carolina. A news conference was set for 1 p.m. today.

Self, who was 78-24 in three years as head coach at Illinois, met with the Kansas players for more than an hour Sunday night.

The players, including three starters from the team that lost by three points to Syracuse in this year's NCAA championship game, liked what they heard.

Williams, who was 418-101 in 15 years at Kansas, shocked the Jayhawks seven days ago when he decided to become head coach at North Carolina, his alma mater and the school he turned down three

years ago.

Self, who spent the past three seasons at Illinois, arrived on campus earlier Sunday and had dinner with chancellor Robert Hemenway, interim athletic director Drue Jennings and several staff members and current players.

A source within the athletic department, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Self didn't want a Sunday announcement because of Easter.

Self's first college coaching job was as an assistant at Kansas under Larry Brown in the 1985-86 season, when the Jayhawks reached the Final Four for the first time since the early '70s. During his three seasons at Illinois, Self led the team to the NCAA tournament each year, reaching the final eight in 2001.

His teams shared the Big Ten regular-season title in 2001 and 2002. This season, the Illini finished second in the league standings but won the tournament championship. Kansas will have to spend \$500,000 to buy out his contract.
