KU close to hiring athletic boss

STORRS, Conn. (AP)—Univertor Lew Perkins is expected to step down by the end of this month to become the athletic director at the University of Kansas, The Hartford Courant reported in today's editions.

An announcement may come as early as Tuesday in Lawrence, Kan., the newspaper reported.

Perkins, 58, who was athletic director at Maryland for three years before coming to UConn in July 1990, emerged as the leading candidate last week and negotiations continued throughout the weekend, The Courant reported, citing sources it did not identify.

Perkins, who declined to com-Sunday night, was to travel to Lawrence today for a meeting with Kansas Chancellor Robert Hemenway.

Kansas was seeking to install a permanent athletic director by July 1, the Lawrence Journal-World reported May 29.
