## Wheat harvest moves slowly

MAYFIELD (AP) — Mayfield farmer Randall Andra waited patiently at the elevator here for his turn to unload a tractor-trailer load of wheat as the harvest picked up speed earlier this week throughout south-central Kansas.

"Couldn't be happier. Wonderful weather," Andra said. "I don't even mind waiting in line."

Andra and his wife, Carol, started cutting their 900 acres of wheat with one combine last Thursday and expect to be finished within a week. His last load at the elevator had test weights of 62 pounds a bushel and he figured he is getting yields around 60 bushels an acre.

"I've got an excellent crop this year — it's probably twice the crop I had last year," he said.

While Andra still managed to get an average crop last year, many farmers in this area were not as lucky. A hail storm downed a lot of

## Kansas officials continue monkeypox case

TOPEKA (AP) — State health officials said this week a young northeast Kansas woman likely has the state's first case of monkeypox among humans or animals.

If confirmed, it would be the among the first cases of monkeypox outside of Wisconsin, Indiana and Illinois. Seven residents of Wisconsin have contracted the disease, as have four each in Indiana and Illinois.

Dr. Gianfranco Pezzino, the Kansas Department of Health and Environment's state epidemiologist, said the Kansas woman was bitten by a prairie dog around June 1 while visiting a northwest Missouri man. Pezzino said health officials in that state believe the 38-

year-old man has Missouri's first case of the disease.

The prairie dog at the Missouri home is still alive and not showing any signs of monkeypox, although a second prairie dog in the same household died.

The Kansas woman, who was not identified by age or hometown, became ill June 10 and was hospitalized Sunday. Pezzino said the woman was in fair condition at Saint John Hospital in Leavenworth and was not expected to remain hospitalized much longer.

Hospitals statewide were told to contact the KDHE if they detected any cases of monkeypox.

"It appears to be a very mild case," said Pezzino, adding three family members who had contact with the woman have been offered

the smallpox vaccine as a precaution. Missouri officials have not yet received confirmation their case is indeed monkeypox, which was first reported late last week.

The man purchased his animals in Illinois, according to the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services.

The Kansas Agricultural Statistics Service reported just one percent of the state's wheat crop has been harvested to date.

The service rated wheat condition as 5 percent very poor, 11 percent poor, 31 percent fair, 42 percent good, and 11 percent excellent.

At the Farmer's Co-op in Mayfield, elevator manager Mike Reed said the area is about average, with test weights ranging from 56 to 61 pounds per bushel.
