The students from KU's

Lawrence campus and the schools of allied health and nursing represent 95 of 105 Kansas counties and 45 states.

The honor roll comprises undergraduates who meet requirements in the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences and in the schools of allied health, architecture and urban de-

sign, business, education, engineering, fine arts, nursing and journalism. The School of Social Welfare does not compile an honor roll.

Honor roll criteria vary among the university's academic units. Some schools honor the top 10 percent of students enrolled, some establish a minimum grade-point average and others raise the minimum GPA for each year students are in school. Students must complete a minimum number of credit hours to be considered for the honor roll.
About 71 percent of KU's 28,849 students are undergraduates.

Old-fashioned business practice still finds flavor

WICHITA — (AP)—Bartering with another business isn't merely as good as a cash transaction, says printing company owner Tim Todd; sometimes, it's better than a cash deal.

For one thing, he said, his membership in a bartering group attracts new customers to his business, Todd Print.

Todd is among hundreds of Kansas business owners who trade goods and services — everything from restaurant meals to hot tubs to vacations — through brokered barter clubs.

In Wichita alone, about 300 are members of Kansas Trade Exchange as well as Tradebank International of Wichita.

Mike Hutchinson, owner of Mike's Body Shop, says his membership in both clubs explains why he and his wife, Kathy, were able to celebrate their 20th anniversary in

New Mexico and Arizona and spend barely anything. They bartered for their vacation.

In bartering groups, business owners trade dollars and then spend them at other members' businesses.

Hutchinson, for example, might fix a fellow member's crashed car and trade out for lawn care or several dinners at a restaurant. "Prices" are set at normal levels.

John and Trudy Schott operate a Wichita-based, Kansas-wide franchise of Tradebank International, whose clients can trade with other Tradebank members around the world. Tradebank International is licensed and regulated like a bank. Accounts are treated like cash accounts, John Schott said. But instead of cash, trade credits are deposited and withdrawn.

Junction City retailers say no to Sunday liquor sales

JUNCTION CITY (AP) — As the push to allow retailers to sell liquor on Sundays gains steam around the state, officials of at least one city won't even consider the idea.

Liquor store owners in Junction City have no interest in opening on Sundays. The costs, they said, wouldn't be worth the potential profit.

"It had the opportunity to generate revenue for the city, but no one wants to do it," Mayor Mick Wunder said, explaining why the City Commission won't bother acting on a proposed ordinance.

City Manager Rod Barnes talked to liquor store owners in Junction City about Sunday sales and found all but one opposed.

"Their feelings were it would take sales away from other days, and there wouldn't be any net gain in sales tax dollars," Barnes said. His office has estimated that the city will take in \$94,856 from liquor sales tax next year, compared with an estimated \$96,388 this year and \$93,201 in 2002.

Kansas traditionally has prohibited retail sales of alcohol on Sun-

days — or was thought to prohibit such sales.

But last year, the way was cleared for Sunday sales when Kansas City, Kan., and the nearby Wyandotte County community of Edwardsville invoked home-rule authority to opt out of the statewide ban. A judge upheld those actions, ruling that the relevant state law had inconsistencies.
