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# Burglary closes **business**

A Colby business specializing in supplies for weightlifters has closed indefinitely following a burglary reported sometime between 5 p.m. on Friday and 2:40 a.m. on Saturday, said Gary Shull, investigator with the police department.

"The burglary occurred when a person or persons entered the rear door by force at the No Pazzing Zone store located at 377 N. Franklin Ave.," he said.

By Sunday, co-owner Chase Kough, was already removing the signage from the storefront windows and likely may not reopen since most of his inventory was sto-

Kough, told police that about 1.200 items were taken with 600 of those items being large five-pound jugs in quantities of one and two gallons. Specifically, the jugs contained name brand items such as Opti-Pro, MET, Rx and Pro Com-

The store, Shull said, caters to body builders and the items stolen were protein-type supplements and other related health aids.

"We assume the vehicle (used in the burglary) was probably a van, box truck, or enclosed trailer," he

The Colby Police Department encourages anyone who might have seen unusual activity during the time of the burglary to call them at

In addition to suspicious behavior the night of the burglary, Shull said that this type of product is not available within a 100-mile radius of Colby.

"Therefore if anyone becomes aware of someone with a large quantity of this type of product, we would like to hear from them," he
