



Test Your Play

1. You are East, defending against Three Notrump, South having opened one notrump, raised by North to three. Your partner leads the four of spades. You cover dummy's five with the seven, and declarer wins with the queen. South leads the jack of diamonds, which you win with the queen. What would you play next? NORTH

EAST S 72 H 9 8 4 3 D Q 4 2 C A Q J 5 2. You are declarer with the West hand at Seven Spades. North leads the king of hearts. How would you play the hand?

EAST WEST S 1098 SAKQJ53 H9652 H DAKOJ **D** 1095 $\mathbf{C}743$ CAK6

1. The correct return is the five of clubs! This play will almost certainly defeat the contract.

Judging from declarer's play, it is highly likely that your partner has the ace of diamonds. South could have something like: SAKQ HAQ65 DJ10 C 9863. That would be consistent with his opening notrump bid and the play to the first two tricks. He can scarcely have the ace of diamonds and attack the suit without cashing the ace first. Once West is credited with the ace of diamonds,

his spades cannot be good enough to justify a spade return. South's weak spot is obviously in clubs, and that is the place to attack. Note that the five must be led, not the queen or jack. When West gets in with the diamond ace, his club return defeats the contract. 2. Ruff the heart high and cross to dummy with a trump. Assuming both opponents follow suit, which is likely, ruff another heart high, return to dummy

with a trump and ruff still another heart. Then play a club to the king and ruff dummy's last heart. This runs you out of trumps, but dummy still has one. Now lead a club to the ace and play the ten of trumps, discarding your club loser. Then claim the last four tricks with the A-K-Q-J of diamonds.

This method of play succeeds whether the trumps are divided 2-2 or 3-1. In all, you score seven trump tricks (four heart ruffs in your hand, plus dummy's 10-9-8 of spades), four diamonds and two clubs.

Solution to a Predicament

Good bridge requires great mental effort. Merely planning to rely on past experience in similar situations will not be good enough in many cases; you must also be able to think things out — independent of what has happened to you before.

For example, take this case where South got to an excellent grand slam and went down one, losing 100 points when he should have made seven diamonds

and scored 2,340 points instead. It didn't take South long to go astray. He won the trump lead with the ten and continued with the ace,

on which East discarded a club. At this point, declarer realized that the only real threat to the contract was the possibility that the hearts might not be divided 3-2. Accordingly, at trick three he led a heart to the queen and then led a heart back to the ace. Unfortunately, West ruffed, and the

grand slam went down the drain. Declarer would have done much better had he taken more effective steps to guard against unfavorable divisions in both diamonds and hearts. All he had to do was cash the ace of clubs at trick two, then

lead a low trump to dummy's nine. Upon discovering the 4-1 trump division, declarer ruffs a club, leads a spade to the queen and ruffs another club with his last trump. Now a spade to the king, followed by the K-J of trumps, puts an end to

By playing this way, South scores all 13 tricks regardless of how the hearts are divided. He finishes with his four natural trump tricks, two club ruffs in his hand, the A-K-Q of spades, the Q-K-A of hearts and the ace of clubs. It all seems ridiculously easy if you stop to think about it. The hard part is to think

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"Are you sure I was wearin' shoes when I left the house?
