College trustees continue to air wellness center

Colby Free Press Plans for a wellness center at Colby Community College are still

For the second time in less than a month, the college's board of trustees discussed the issue at their Monday meeting.

College President Dr. Mikel Ary reviewed the information on the proposed center and the steps that have already been taken.

He also recommended forming a committee to discuss a site location and to get community involvement.

Ary told the board the process has included trips to the wellness centers at Lamar (Colo.) Community College, Sterling (Colo.) Junior College and the Northwest Kansas Technical College in Goodland.

That was followed by recommendations on what a center should have, a survey of people at the last community wellness fair and sending out solicitation letters to try to

Ary said more than 100 people were surveyed at the wellness fair and responded that they would use an indoor walking track if it were

An architect has also been selected, Glen Strait of Strait Associ-

Congress in February and is making its way through the Congressional Appropriations Committee in Washington.

He also updated the board on the college's enrollment initiatives.

He said the new college view books were just received.

"We're very proud of that," Ary said, adding the books are used to attract students and provide information on the school and admissions applications.

He also said the school's Web site is proving useful since students are using it to pre-enroll.

"For the moment, we have a very attractive Web site," Ary said.
