Each year, the Kansas Insurance Department receives thousands of phone calls from consumers asking for answers to their insurance ques-

More than half of those calls are related to a single topic: health insurance. While many of these questions are related to specific issues with single health insurance policies, we also hear many questions about the cost, availability and status of health insurance in general.

A recent statewide survey of Kansans indicates about 10.5 percent of our state's population is living without any health insurance. The survey was funded by the federal Health Resources and Services Administration and administered by the Kansas Insurance Department and the University of Kansas Medical Center.

Junia Hale has been a guest of her son Roger for a few days. While she was here they took advantage of several of the community dinners in the area and the United States Air Force Band performance.


