Hospital named in another lawsuit

Free Press Editor A Colby man has filed a civil lawsuit against Colby's hospital alleging negligence during a procedure done at the facility for checking kidney and bladder functions. The petition was filed early last week in the Thomas County District Court.

Dean Birdsall, through his attorney Aaron Krannawitter of Hoxie, is asking for damages in excess of more than \$500,000 for himself and family as a result of the damage to his arm, his lost wages, medical expenses, future problems, pain and suffering and other related issues to include loss of consortium.

Birdsall alleges that in July of 2002 an employee at Citizens Medical Center caused harm to him by injecting dye into his vein in order to check kidney and bladder functions.

the vein and the dye was injected into Birdsall's arm resulting in severe damage and loss of usage along with continued pain.

Thus far, the medical expenses have exceeded \$10,000 with more expenses in the future. He said he has also lost work time and will incur future losses in wages.

In the lawsuit, Birdsall is asking the court to require Citizens Medical Center to pay for his current and future medical expenses and lost wages of \$10,000 for each; to further pay \$75,000 or more for the damage to his arm and more than \$250,000 for his pain and suffering and loss of consortium with that same amount of \$250,000 or more granted to his wife, Garrah Birdsall, and their children, also because of the damage to their relationship caused by this alleged negligent act.
