Colby airport plan receives approval of the city council

The airport layout plan and south apron/taxi lanes improvement projects were approved by the Colby City Council at its meeting Tuesday, but will still be subject to Federal Administration's review and acceptance as well.

The decision to go forward with the plans came after the airport board met last week and recommended the council should approve the agreements and proceed with the projects.

The estimated cost to the city for both the design and actual improvements would be about \$100,000, said Carolyn Armstrong, city manager, with FAA funding at \$300,000.

It is also possible, she said, that airport improvements and the layout plan could be done in two phases. The first phase being the layout plan next year and the second phase the actual improvement
