Wheat should be showing up in Thomas County fields. But due to dry conditions, there

isn't much coming up right now. Roger Stockton, Northwest Research-Extension Center soil and crop specialist, said no moisture is having an adverse affect on the growing wheat.

"There's a lot of wheat that didn't come up," he said.

"It's not doing too good for the most part."

Stockton said the average condition is "not good at all." Little to no precipitation and no

reserve moisture in the soil is hurting wheat and native pasture alike, he said. Stockton said the wheat won't come up very much until spring

but if the temperature is above 40 degrees and the ground isn't frozen, it will try to grow. "It doesn't use very much water this time of year," Stockton

said, but it does need a little to help with the early growth. "If we'd get some rain, it would amaze us as to how quickly it

would come out," he said. Stockton said wheat is a resilient crop and could rebound if there is significant precipitation of any kind.
