Requests to use the Thomas County Fairgrounds for different events was one of the items the board dealt with.




"This award represents a lot of hard work by our staff, from the news department through advertising and the press," said Mr. Haynes.

above and beyond the ordinary run of news coverage, but judges are allowed to split the award if they consider an effort by smaller newspapers to be worthy. In this case, the judges gave two

awards. The other went to The Wichita Eagle for a three-year project to reveal crimes by Kansas parolees. The newspaper had to sue to get the information, taking the case to the state Supreme Court under the Open Records Act. It eventually discovered more than two dozen murders by felons supposedly under state supervision.
