Rotarians get ready for annual soup supper

The Colby Rotary Club met on Feb. 10, 2004 with guests John Henry, Kevin Taylor and prospective member Sharon Dunn. President Jerry Arnsdorf directed the meeting. The first thing he spoke on was the Soup Supper to be held Tuesday, Feb. 17 at the Colby Community Building during the Goodland vs. Colby basketball games. The work schedule looks to have a great turnout to help with this project. Cindy Cersovsky noted that this coincides with Family Rotary Week and has asked members to make the Soup Supper a family

Lon Frahm has been a Rotarian several years and is an area farmer. Lon has been on the board of directors for Midwest Energy for eight years. This being his last, he currently holds the treasurer position. Lon said that Midwest Energy employs about 270 personnel. The natural gas cooperative services around 100,000 meters. He told club members that Midwest has the lowest rates for natural gas and electric energy. These rates are regulated by the Kansas Corporation Commission.

In November Midwest Energy reached and agreement with Westar Energy to acquire assets to service 10,000 electric customers adjacent to the existing territory. This will increase operation efficiency and benefit the existing and new customers. Doing this will spread overhead and infrastructure costs among more customers.

Lon spoke more on the electric energy that comes from the Gray County Wind Farm. This wind farm is the largest energy-generating facility in Kansas. The generators are 300 feet tall, weighing about 290,000 pounds. The wind farm • Corey A. Bunch of Fountain, runs about 170 towers. It takes a 7-8 mile per hour wind to turn the blades. The towers need at least 9-10 mile per hour winds to generate power. If the wind exceeds 50 miles per hour they shut them down.

These generators have to have the right constancy to be able to use the energy produced. To get this energy to be used efficiently and economically a facility has to be close to a transmission line due to the cost of these lines at \$1 million per mile.

Hospital chairman reported 14 dozen cookies taken to Lantern Park. Action was taken to send lap robes and cookies to Fort Dodge soldier's home.




