

Eagles go 1-2 at state

It didn't turn out as hoped. But all you can do is give it your best.

That best explains the Colby Lady Eagles' experience at this past week's Class 4A State Basketball Tournament at the Bicentennial Center in Salina.

The ladies opened on a high note with a 45-35 victory over Kansas City-Bishop Ward last Wednesday.

That set the stages for a semifinal showdown against Topeka-Hayden on Friday night.

The name of this game was "stall" and in the end the Eagles fell, 18-17.

The strategy designed by the Eagle coaching staff to hold the ball against a taller, quicker team, looked for a while like the winning combination.

But in the end the Topeka bunch prevailed in the lowest scoring game in state tournament history.

The Eagles' 17 points were the fewest ever scored by a team in a single game.

Hayden led at the end of the first quarter, 11-5, but the Eagles came 'roaring' back to take a 15-13 half-time lead. And at the end of three, Colby was still on top,
