Matthew Harper Hamill

Matthew Harper Hamill was called home to the Lord on April 21, 2004. He was surrounded by his children and grandchildren who, with tears of sorrow and joy, celebrated his life and sent him gently on his way.

Matt was born on February 1, 1914 to Albert and Zella Hamill. He was the second of seven children and spent his early years on the family farm five miles northwest of Colby. He attended grade school in Brownville and in 1932 graduated from Colby High School, where he made a name for himself in football and basketball. In 1936 he married Violet Blanche Schneider and with this lovely woman raised a family of seven: Tim of Lawrence, KS; Tom of Prairie Village, KS; Dick of Overland Park, KS; Greg of Baldwin City, KS; Sue Kistler of Colby; Anne Dreiling of Lenexa, KS and Chris of Baldwin City, KS. Violet preceded Matt in death on November 5, 1975. In addition to his children and their spouses, Matt leaves behind his wife Erma of Colby; stepchildren Warren Griggs of Morris, OK and Marsha Gaede of Colby; eighteen grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren; brothers Wayne Hamill of Ontario, CA and Virgil "Rusty' Hamill of Fort Collins, CO.

If Matt loved his family, he was passionate about his town. He spent nearly all of his adult years in Colby and dedicated body and soul to building this small city on the Kansas prairie. As an entrepreneur, he opened Matt's Service Store in 1939. After returning from a two-year stint in the Navy, he started Colby Tire and Battery in 1949 and operated it for more than forty years.

As a civic leader, Matt was a founding member of the Colby Economic Development Committee and the Colby Ambassadors. In addition, he was a member of both the Lions Club and the Colby Chamber of Commerce for over 60 years, president of the Highway 24 Association for more than thirty years, and remained active in the Highway 25 Association until his death. He served on the Colby City Council, the board of High Plains Mental Health, the Strategic Planning Industrial Board, Special Advisory Board for Citizens Medical Center, Assembly of God Church Board, RSVP Board, Advisory Board for Lantern Park Manor and the Ace Services Board.

In addition to this long list of pursuits, Matt served as the first president of the Thomas County Economic Development Corporation and used his time in this position to help get the route of Interstate 70 to touch the southern edge of the city. With other civic and business leaders, he worked for the creation of a two-year college in town, then served three terms on the Colby Community College Board of Trustees. Indeed, the Colby, Kansas that its citizens know today is in no small measure a reflection of the energy and determination of Matt Hamill.

It is for this perseverance Matt has received many awards and much recognition such as the Governor's Award for /olunteerism, the KXXX Personal Service Award, and the Colby Chamber of Commerce Business Person of the Year. Most recently, Matt was named a Melvin Jones Fellow by the Lions Club International Foundation, which is the highest form of recognition by this organization, and awarded Honorary Associates Degree, the college's most prestigious public award. To honor Matt's life, the Matt Hamill Memorial Scholarship Fund has been established to support students attending Colby Community College. Matt Hamill will no longer walk the streets of the town he called home nor grace the table of his beloved family. But no amount of time will lessen the memory of his quiet strength and humble demeanor. As he was loved in life, he will be profoundly missed in death, and his family and friends will hold the fire of his spirit in their hearts.
