Nellie Leone Flynt

Nellie Leone (McKinley, Michael) Flynt, 86, of Ft. Collins, Colo., passed away February 8, 2004, at the Poudre Valley Hospital in Ft. Collins. A Celebration of her Life will be held at 8 a.m. Monday, May 31, 2004, at the United Methodist Church in Winona with Rev. Michael W. Eurit officiating. Visitation with the family will follow the service in the Community Room at the Church. Private inurnment was in the Winona Cemetery in Winona.

Nellie was born August 11, 1917, the sixth of 10 children born to Ora E. and Nancy Samantha (Bess) McKinley in a sod house on the homestead north of Wallace, Kansas. Nellie moved to Winona with the family in 1924. She attended Wallace and Winona schools. Nellie and Guy Uda Michael were married on August 26, 1934. To this union three children were born: Donna Nadine, David Eugene and Sharen Sue. On December 18, 1954, Nellie married John W. Flynt, and to this union two children were born: Franklin Dee and John Patrick.

Nellie had a full and fruitful life. Nellie and Guy operated a creamery and shoe repair shop. She went into business for herself when she bought the Ice Cream Shop and then the Pool Hall. She combined the two and made it into the Sugar Bowl in February 1941. The Sugar Bowl, later known as Johnnellies Café, was on the main street of Winona. She earned her pilot's license in 1949 and purchased a Cessna 120, NC76369, that gave her much pleasure and years of memories. A move to Colorado in 1963 led her to the grocery business operating a store in Silverthorne for 10 years. Flynt's Market was known as the little store that had everything. In 1974 she left the mountains to pursue a career in warehouse sales at Creager's Market in Denver, and retired from there in 1983.

Nellie returned to Winona, purchased a home which had been built by the McKinley family, and settled into a life of retired leisure. From this time on, Nellie chose which mountains of life to climb. She became an avid gardener; enhanced her artistic talents by taking painting classes and painting many pictures; learned the International Morse Code, electronic theory and earned the Amateur Radio Operator License, WAOMDN; completed a variety of needlework projects; cooked great meals for family gatherings; traveled visiting family and friends; became an avid photographer, and shared and enjoyed all of her hobbies for many years. The dawning of the home computer age was not lost on Nellie. She mastered this technology and for several years provided monthly newsletters to family and friends and some months mailed them in hand-decorated envelopes.

She was preceded in death by her parents; brothers Andrew Josiah McKinley, Franklin Eugene McKinley, Ora Wayne McKinley and Clarence Albert (Mac) McKinley; sisters Cecelia Alta Yearout, Marjorie Leora Hileman and Jennie Velda Mae Tauscher; and a granddaughter, Mary Katheryn Eichman. She was a great gal. We'll miss you, Nellie.




