Jo De Young, district financial officer, said the transfer of \$230,444 was to forward-fund three programs for the 2004-2005 school

She said \$85,000 was transferred to special education, \$52,641 for inservice education and \$92,603 for food service. The money was transferred from the general fund to each

"It reduces the amount of money you have to transfer next year," De Young said.

"We try to be consistent. It's a routine transfer."


