College names new dean of fiscal affairs

has been selected as the Dean of Fiscal Affairs at Colby Community College. Erbert replaces Ken Johnson who recently resigned from the college after



serving in that capacity for 15 years. Erbert has extensive experience in higher education. He served as chief operations officer at Cloud County Community College in Concordia for five years and as vice president of administrative services at Trinidad State Junior College in Trinidad, Colo. for three years.

A native of Stratton, Colo., Erbert was the owner of a training, consulting and design business. In addition, he served as finance director for a human services agency in Trinidad.

Prior to his work in higher education, he was the business administrator for the Lamar (Colo.) Public Schools for five years. As chief operations officer for the K-12 public school system which includes 2,000 students and 300 employees, Erbert was responsible for budgets in excess of \$11 million.

At Trinidad State Junior College, Erbert had fiscal responsibility for budgets in excess of \$17 million. Trinidad Junior College has 3,500 students and 350 employees at two major campuses and satellite sites. In addition to his other duties, Erbert managed the completion of approximately \$7 million of capital construction. He also developed and implemented the administrative staff pay for performance (merit pay) plan and initiated and sponsored a nontraditional student organization.

During his tenure at Cloud County Community College, Erbert managed the process which grew the school's general fund balance from \$5,000 to almost \$1 million. Cloud has approximately Dec. 1.

3,000 students and 450 employees at two major campuses. He directed efforts that provided a clean fiscal audit which had been a perpetual issue at the college.

Erbert was recognized by his peers as the recipient of the Region II "Outstanding Chief Business Officer" award in October 2001. The award is given by the Community College Business Officers Or-

He is a member of several professional organizations including the Colorado Association of Community and Junior College Business Officials, Kansas Association of Community College Business Officials, Association of School Business Officials International, Association of College Administration Professionals and Colorado Association of School Executives. Erbert is a director of the Trinidad Las Animas County Economic Development Board and a director on the Department of Business Officials Board for Colorado.

Erbert served as chair and negotiator for the salary and benefits committee at Larimer County Voc-Tech Center and was a representative for the Colorado Department of Education Financial Policies and Procedures Committee.

"We are very pleased that Dan will be joining our administrative team," said Dr. Mikel Ary, Colby College president. "He brings a wide variety of experience in postsecondary education. His background and professional accomplishments are outstanding and we look forward to the positive contributions he will make at Colby Community College."

Erbert earned a bachelor's degree in business administration and a master's degree in occupational administration and supervision from Colorado State University. He is completing work on a doctoral degree in community college leadership, also at Colorado State University in Fort Collins.
