Communication contract questioned

Colby Free Press Thomas County's 2005 communications contract was one of the items on the agenda at Tuesday's end of month meeting of the county

Undersheriff Mike Baughn and Kathi Wright and Martin Rinehart with the county's emergency medical service discussed the contract, approved at a November meeting, but the three had some reservations about it. They were concerned about budgetary shortfalls at the end of next year because both EMS and the sheriff's office authorized what was spent last year when costs have gone up.

"This was something we all over looked," Baughn said.

Wright said she had no problem with paying salary but had issues with paying social security, disability, health insurance and worker's

"We're in the red before we even get started," she said.

Rinehart suggested negotiating for just the salary, but commissioner Ron Evans said the insurance and other benefits are part of salary.

He said part of the problem was that the county received the contract later than usual. Commissioner Glen Kersenbrock said it's cheaper

All parade participants are asked p.m. near the TNT Auction building so they can be lined up for the event.


Regarding the many people who volunteer their time to the event, Eicher said there are too many to name, adding that every year it's the entire community that makes the parade successful.
