ville Brown of Sacramento, Calif., was arrested at about 2:51 a.m., Monday, after police officers went to a nearby motel and questioned him about his recent whereabouts, said Gary Shull,

Before being booked into the Thomas County Jail on Monday afternoon, Brown was first admitted to Citizens Medical Center for medical reasons and later that day was taken to jail.

said, Brown was charged with two counts of burglary, three felony criminal damage, one count each of misdemeanor damage and criminal trespassing. Bond was set at \$50,000 with his first appearance held today.

The incident was first discovered by Colby Police Officer Ron Alexander who noticed the back door of Fotogirl Photography located in about \$700," Michelle said Tues-Southwind Plaza was open at about 2 a.m. In looking around, Alexander saw that in addition to glass front door at the photography business being shattered, the glass front door at the western store was also broken

Alexander then called for assistance from the K-9 Unit, other Colby police officers and deputies glass shattered.

In looking for a suspect, Shull said that prior to the break-ins, came out of this incident was the Colby police were alerted that a man traveling by Greyhound had not gotten back on the bus when it had stopped in Colby.

The circumstances as to why he did not continue traveling on the bus were unclear, according to information from the police department.

The investigation led police officers to a Colby motel where they saw Brown coming out of a room. While questioning Brown as to whether or not he knew anything about the break-ins, he told authori-

Although Shull could not talk about Brown's medical condition, he did say that officers took the suspect to Citizens Medical Center just before 3 a.m. Monday, where he was treated and released later that afternoon. Shull did say that while at the hospital, Brown was under guard for a pre-existing medical condition.

Following his release from the hospital, Brown was booked and was still in custody today.

Store owners at Southwind Plaza talked about the experience, adding that it could have been a lot worse.

Vaughn Nash, owner of Out West, said he had about \$1,400 damage, but also felt fortunate that nobody was hurt.

Natural gas prices are going up 35-45 percent

The cost of staying warm this winter will be 35 to 45 percent higher than last year, said officials with Midwest Energy today.

"Customers have been hearing about it for months, and now customers will be seeing it in their December bills," said Bob Helm, with the Midwest Energy office in Hays.

The reason for the increase was based on the dramatic increase in the wholesale cost of gas over the last several months, he said.

"The cost to buy the natural gas

itself is the culprit, said Earnie Lehman, president and manager of Midwest Energy. "Natural gas follows the price of oil and compared with last year, those energy costs are simply higher.'

For those wanting to know why wholesale gas prices are rising, Lehman said there are many rea-

Cold weather in most sections of the country, a strengthening economy in the U.S. and around the world, and flat production in some areas all contribute to the increase

"This is the coldest time of the year and customers will use more natural gas to keep warm, so bills will normally be higher, even before factoring in the price increase," Lehman said.

There is some good news, though, he said. As one way to deal creases, gas purchases for December, January and February will dampen that effect in the event higher costs should continue.

costs, Midwest Energy customers should consider budget billing, Helm said. With budget billing, bills are average over 12 months to level out the highs and lows of seasonal costs.
