



Famous Hand

When there's a borderline choice between which of two bids to make, you never know when exercising one choice might lead to tremendous success, while exercising the other might lead to absolute ruin.

This very situation arose in dramatic fashion on the accompanying deal from the 1970 World Championship match between Brazil and the United States.

At the first table, with Bobby Wolff and Jim Jacoby North-South for the United States, the bidding went as shown.

Jacoby opened with one heart, when he could just as easily have opened with one spade, and this paid off handsomely when he wound up making six hearts doubled for a score of 1,210 points.

There was nothing to the play. Jacoby ruffed the club lead, drove out the ace of hearts and claimed the rest of the tricks.

At the second table, with Gabriel Chagas and Pedro Assumpçao holding the North-South cards for Brazil, the bidding went:

North East South West Pass Pass 1 S 2 D 2H4 D 4 H 4 S Dble Pass Pass 5 D 6 S Dble 6 C

Here South opened with a spade, the effect of which was that his side lost a slam. Eventually South wound up in six spades, which could not be made after West led a club.


Declarer ruffed the club lead and played a round of trumps.

When West showed out, South could not afford to continue trumps, so he played a heart, hoping for a 1-1 division. West thereupon took the ace and returned a heart for East to ruff, and the slam went down one.

Observe that even if North had ended up in six hearts at this table (North had bid hearts SOMETHING YOU DON'T WANT MOTHER TO first), the slam would likewise have failed against a spade lead by East.
