# Lights will stay on at **Lantern Park Manor**

After talking with the management group at Lantern Park Manor late last week, city officials said they are "confident" the situation involving its utility bill will be resolved.

"The lights will stay on at Lantern Park Manor," said Carolyn Armstrong, city manager today.

Prompted by an article in the Colby Free Press last Wednesday, David Goldner with Premiere Healthcare Management, based in North Hollywood, Calif., and the group overseeing Lantern Park, will be meeting with Armstrong next Tuesday.

"I am extremely pleased that we will have a face-to-face meeting with Mr. Goldner on Feb. 1 to resolve the utility bills at Lantern Park Manor," she said.

Armstrong added that Goldner has provided information on the water usage they are disputing and the city will be verifying all their records because of the utility billing software problems during the sum-"The local Lantern Park Manor

When the city changed back to its old system, the mistake was caught and Lantern Park was billed the entire amount of \$13,000.

# Three arrested in connection with property theft at college

Almost \$4,000 worth of items DVD movies. were taken from at least six dorm

In response to rooms on the Colby Community these crimes, three College campus and police have search warrants arrested three people in connection with the crimes.

Suspected in the thefts were Jo-searches in Colby, seph DeLancey, 18, who formerly rural attended Colby College and is from Benkelman, Neb., along with Cody Earl Graham, 18, a college student from Parks, Neb., and Jeremiah Bell, 21, also a student at Colby College, said Gary Shull, investigator with the Colby police.

The thefts first came to the attention of Colby police on Friday, Dec. 17, he said, when students started reporting items stolen from their dorm rooms with the latest victim filing a complaint on Monday, Jan.

Property taken from the dorm bedrooms of at least five victims, Shull said, included electronic campus for possession of stolen equipment such as laptop comput-

"Most, but not all of the property has been recovered," Shull said, "and some of it has been damaged."

Bell and DeLancey were both arrested on Monday, Jan. 17, and formally charged by Thomas County Attorney Andrea Wyrick on Thursday, he said. Bell was charged with felony theft and computer crime, which is also a felony and DeLancey faces one charge of felony theft.

The following day, Graham was taken into custody on the college property, but has not been formally

None of the three suspects were charged with burglary.

In the initial warrant, DeLancey and Bell had \$10,000 bonds that were reduced later to \$1,000 at their first court appearance.
