Colby School district finds pot of gold to enhance budget

Colby Free Press The Colby School Board received some good news at its meeting this week.

The district will be getting more money for this year's budget.

They found out during a discus-2004-2005 budget.

District financial officer Jo De-Young said the audit is complete.

"This is the earliest audit we've ever had," she said.

up because the Korean War had started. They were told they weren't going home but they did come home. Others weren't so lucky.


That was the closest Chase, Fromholtz and Shull came to active duty, but they served 12, 10 and 17 years, respectively.
