On May 20, 1950 he married Betty Finley of Brewster three days after her high school graduation. They moved to the Jess and Char-ity Finley family farm where they spent their entire married life farm- ing.

He also continued to work for in the plumbing business.

He was a member of Pleasant Home Church and later Levant Community Church.

Mr. Wolfe is survived by his wife, Betty, of Brewster; three daughters, Gloria Tiedemann of Brewster, Micki Goossen of Liberal and Lila Engelhardt of Liberal; three grand- daughters and three great-grand- children.

He was preceded in death by his parents, one brother and three grandchildren.

Services were held this morning at Brewster Community Church with Pastor Mike Pinkelman and Pastor Fran Harwerth officiating. Burial followed at Brewster Cem- etery.
