Bailey's chant originally was "Rah, Rah, Jayhawk, KU."

The house dates to 1855 and was built by Jim Savage, who moved to Lawrence from Vermont with a group from the New England Emigrant Aid Society and was a friend of Bailey.

"My grandfather liked to take science club members picnicking on the farm, and they would practice the yell out there," said Carolyn Bailey Berneking, Bailey's granddaughter, who attended a recent party to celebrate the home's 150th anniversary.

The house then was on a farm on 160 acres south of town, so there were no neighbors around to object to the club's summer parties.


