lating about whether Jerry Moran would leave his safe seat in the U.S. House to run a grueling and difficult race for governor. And for the second time, Moran said no.

He cited family concerns, but there were other, compelling reasons for him to stay put, which made his decision appear predictable. Gambling an entire political career on a dicey-at-best run against Democratic Gov. Kathleen Sebelius was a low-percentage move for him.

To many Republicans, Moran seemed an ideal gubernatorial candidate, someone who could unite factions within the party that have long feuded, perhaps since statehood. Also, Moran's sprawling 1st Congressional District covers twothirds of the state, from the Colorado border to within 40 miles of the Missouri border in the north. A statewide campaign would not h

Many Republicans don't see Sebelius as particularly vulnerable.

Is it likely that moderate Republicans who routinely back spending increases for schools and are willing to raise taxes are going to forsake Sebelius? How many moderates privately scoffed at conservatives' criticism of "activist" justices?

Even if Sebelius were vulnerable, she proved a whiz in 2002 at sucking money out of potential donors, raising a record \$4 million.

### **Oakley resident** is selling corn to help project



"I planted 11 rows and people can come and pick it," Hockersmith said. He said his father, Willis Hockersmith, died of cancer and he wants to help with the relay (7 p.m. Friday to 7 a.m. Saturday at the Oakley athletic field near the high school).

The corn is located 1 mile south and 1/4 mile west of the golf course which is located at the intersection of highways U.S. 83 and U.S. 40 in Oakley.

"I was lucky, I had a doctor who cancer. At 10 p.m., 1,019 luminarinsisted in me getting a mammogram and I had it detected early. I had the support of my family, church and youth group and the community and many prayers,"

"Cancer can be a blessing. It makes you realize you have people who love and support you. Remember, get your check-ups or some day you could be walking around the track with us, or maybe not," she said.
