



County health building gets extra protection

Security at the Thomas County Health Department was on the agenda at Monday's Thomas Countv commissioners meeting. Department administrator Juanita Dewey came to ask the commissioners missioners told him to see if someabout installing locks on the windows at her department. The commissioners did approve the request, and the money will come out of the health department's budget.
